The very scarce issue in cloth: most copies were issued in wrappers.

2 BENTHAM, George. Flora Hongkongensis: a description of the flowering plants and ferns of the island of Hongkong. London, 1861. Octavo, with a map; original gilt-decorated cloth. Stamp on half-title only, a very good copy.

3 BENTHAM, George and MUELLER, Ferdinand von. Flora Australiensis; a description of the plants of the Australian territory. London, 1863-78. Seven volumes octavo; original gilt-decorated cloth. Three volumes stamped, five with a presentation inscription from von Mueller. A very good set.

4 BROWN, Robert. Vermischte botanische Schriften. Leipzig and Nuremberg, 1825-1834. Five volumes octavo, with 10 folding plates and 3 folding tables; contemporary half calf over marbled boards. Label of Russian collection on pastedowns, with press label at head of spines, a nice, clean set.

The only contemporary collected edition of Brown's botanical works, edited by C.G. Nees von Esenbeck. Volume three is entirely devoted to a new edition of his *Prodromus Florae Novae Hollandiae et Insulae Van Diemen*,

with authorial revisions, and other volumes include his supplement to this work and Brown's botanical register for the voyages of Flinders and Phillip Parker King. \$2000-3000

5 CAMPBELL, Archibald. Nests and eggs of Australian birds. Sheffield, 1900. Two volumes thick large octavo, with 28 coloured plates, map and numerous photographic plates; original gilt-decorated green cloth (slightly flecked). A very good pair. \$1200-1500

6 DARWIN, Charles. On the origin of species. New York, 1860. Octavo; in modern cloth. Contemporary inked names on title (L. Carper and James Peasley, Carper's running down the page), otherwise a clean copy. The first American edition, distinguished by the presence of only two quotations on the half-title verso. \$1000-1500

7 DARWIN, Charles. The expression of the emotions in man and animals. London, 1872. Octavo, with 7 heliotype plates and text illustrations; original cloth (a little rubbed). Signature at head of title of H.E. Harrison of St Arnaud in western Victoria, dated 1873, with his small stamped crest in the margin and two other margins, one opening a bit stained, a little foxing; but a good, firm copy. First edition, first issue, with Freeman's distinguishing points, though lacking the preliminary blank he calls for, apparently as issued. Plate numbering in Roman. \$500-700

8 DARWIN, Charles. The variation of animals and plants under domestication. Second edition, revised. London, 1875. Two volumes octavo, with text illustrations; original gilt and blind-stamped cloth. Contemporary signature at head of title of H. E. Harrison, with his small stamped crest in the margin and a few other margins. A very good, bright set.

The first printing of the final, corrected text, the number of copies printed of the work having reached four thousand. \$400-600

Facsimile of the manuscript, with introduction by Richard Darwin Keynes. Edition limited to 500 numbered copies signed by G.P. Darwin. \$400-600

11 DARWIN, Charles, *editor*. The zoology of the voyage of H.M.S. Beagle during the years 1832-36. Wellington, [1980]. Three volumes large quarto, with numerous plates, those of birds and mammals coloured; original quarter leather. Fine.

12 EVELYN, John. Sylva, or a discourse on forest-trees and the propagation of timber . . . Terra, a philosophical essay of earth . . . to which is annexed Pomona or, an appendix concerning fruit-trees in relation to cider. . . Also Kalendarium Hortense, or the gardner's Almanac. Third edition, much enlarged and improved. London, 1679. Folio, with 5 engraved illustrations in the text, errata leaf at end; contemporary speckled calf with remains of manuscript paper spine label (joints cracking but quite sound). A little browning, a very good, large copy. \$600-800

13 GOULD, John. The mammals of Australia. London, [1843]-63. Three volumes large folio, with 182 hand-coloured plates finished with gum arabic, by the author, Elizabeth Gould and H. C. Richter; nineteenth-century burgundy morocco (slightly rubbed), spines panelled with gilt ornaments, gilt edges, by Pearcey of Taunton. Some foxing of the text and plates, as often, but most plates clean or only very slightly affected.

The first survey of the subject, with wonderful plates, some of which have become iconic images. Gould writes in his introduction that 'It was not until I arrived in the country and found myself surrounded by objects as strange as if I had been transported to another planet, that I conceived

the idea of devoting a portion of my attention to the mammalian class of its extraordinary fauna'. Many species are depicted here for the first time; more than twenty have become extinct.

With the signature in the first volume, dated 1882, of Arthur W. Young, a London lawyer who formed a magnificent library including a Gutenberg Bible; signed also by Geoffrey Edelsten, great grandson of the author, and with the bookplates of the Australian naturalist John Calaby. \$600-800

16 GOULD, John. Handbook to the birds of Australia, another set, in the original cloth (spine of first volume repaired at head, joints wearing, hinges weakening). \$400-500

17 GOULD, John. The birds of Australia. London, 1848-1869 [*reprinted in facsimile*, Melbourne, 1975]. Eight volumes large folio, with 681 coloured plates; publisher's imitation morocco.

Now scarce: only about 500 sets were completed. \$2000-3000

18 GOULD, John. A synopsis of the birds of Australia and the adjacent islands. London, 1837-38 [*reprinted in facsimile*, Melbourne, 1979]. Tall octavo, with 73 coloured plates; half morocco in card slipcase. Fine.

19 GREW, Nehemiah. Musaeum Regalis Societatis, or a catalogue & description of the natural and artificial rarities belonging to the Royal Society and preserved at Gresham College. Whereunto is subjoined the Comparative anatomy of stomachs and guts. London, 1681. Small folio, with portrait and 31 plates; contemporary vellum (a bit marked). Slight foxing, small marginal stain on a few plates, but an excellent, large copy, with the bookplate of the English academic and antiquarian John Willis

Clark, who was Superintendent of the Cambridge Museum of Zoology from 1866 to 1892: an appealing provenance. Inked corrections on 5 leaves, as usual. \$2000-2500

20 [JACKSON, Sidney W.]. Egg collecting and bird life of Australia. Catalogue and data of the 'Jacksonian Oological Collection'. Sydney, 1907. Quarto, pp.viii, 172, with numerous photographic illustrations; original cloth-backed printed wrappers.

Printed for private circulation in an edition of 100 copies and very scarce; this copy inscribed by the author in 1910 to the naturalist Richard Helms, whose own egg collection went to the Western Australian Museum. He is now chiefly remembered as the naturalist on the Elder Scientific Exploring Expedition of 1891-92. \$1500-2000

21 McCOY, Frederick. Geological Survey of Victoria. Prodomus of the palaeontology of Victoria, or figures and descriptions of Victorian organic remains. Melbourne, 1874-82. The seven parts, all published, large octavos, with 70 lithographed plates, mostly tinted; in one volume, binder's cloth. Occasional foxing, several stamps (one on a plate margin). Scarce. \$300-400

22 MEREDITH, Louisa Anne. Some of my bush friends in Tasmania. Native flowers, berries and insects drawn from life and illustrated in verse. London, 1860. Folio, with 13 chromolithographed plates including additional title, and text illustrations; original elaborately gilt-decorated cloth (rebacked with the spine mounted), gilt edges. Slight foxing, scarcely affecting the plates, fore-edge of two plates a little frayed. \$400-500

23 MEREDITH, Louisa Anne. Bush friends in Tasmania. Native flowers, fruits and insects drawn from nature, with prose descriptions and illustrations in verse. Last series. London, 1891. Folio, with 14 chromolithographed plates including pictorial title and dedication leaf, and 9 other plates; original elaborately gilt-decorated cloth, gilt edges. A few small stamps, slight foxing scarcely affecting the plates, the binding well-preserved, a very good copy. Edition limited to 700 signed and numbered copies. \$500-700

24 MUELLER, Ferdinand von. *Fragmenta phytographiae Australiae*. Melbourne, 1858-81. Eleven volumes octavo, with 65 plates (misnumbered); seven in the publisher's cloth (one a little worn, each with a stamp on the title), the balance in similar nineteenth-century grained cloth for the Royal Society of Victoria (one of these with a few stamps). *With* COOKE, M.C. *Fungi Australiani. Supplementum ad Fragmentorum phytographiae Australiae*. Melbourne, 1883. Octavo, with 4 coloured plates; original printed wrappers (stamped and a little worn). Very scarce complete. Two volumes with a presentation inscription from von Mueller. \$800-1000

25 MUELLER, Ferdinand von. *Analytical drawings of Australian mosses. I Fascicle* [all published]. Melbourne, 1864. Octavo, with 20 lithographed plates; original limp grained purple cloth (slightly faded). Edition limited to 675 numbered copies. A good set of this suitably massive work. \$1000-1500

Dresden and Leipzig, 1845. Octavo; original boards (wearing but sound) with printed label. Stamp on preliminaries, foxed. Translation of the text to Gould's *Birds of Australia*; two further volumes were published, in 1847 and 1850. Ludwig Becker's copy, signed by him at the head of the title and dated Melbourne, 1856: a rare provenance, the only example we have seen. \$500-800

30 SPENCER, W. Baldwin, *editor*. Report on the work of the Horn Scientific Expedition to Central Australia. Part II, Zoology; Part III, Geology and Botany. Melbourne, 1896. Two volumes quarto, with lithographed plates, some coloured; contemporary buckram. Stamp on a blank preliminary leaf of each volume, nice clean copies. \$800-1000

31 WALLACE, Alfred Russel. The geographical distribution of animals. With a study of the relations of living and extinct faunas as elucidating the past changes of the earth's surface. London, 1876. Two volumes thick octavo, with 7 maps and 20 plates; original cloth, gilt monogram ornament on the front boards, top edges gilt. Joints a trifle worn, some foxing, a very good, tight set. Later bookplates in each volume, and tiny circular blind stamp of an early owner at head of titles. \$1500-2000

Thick octavo, with 2 folding plans, folding table and numerous illustrations, mostly from photographs; original cloth. An excellent copy of a very uncommon work, with no auction sale records. \$800-1000

33 DAVID, *Sir* T.W. Edgeworth. The geology of the Commonwealth of Australia. London, [1950]. Two volumes thick octavo, with numerous plates, maps, sections and tables, and map case with 5 large folding

coloured maps; original cloth in dustjackets, the case of cloth-edged boards and dustjacket. Stamp on titles, versos of maps and tables and on jackets. \$300-400

34 HAAST, Julius. Geology of the Provinces of Canterbury and Westland, New Zealand. Christchurch, 1879. Octavo, with folding frontispiece, 3 folding maps, two coloured, and one other map, 6 folding plates from photographs, 11 plates of geological sections, two folding and coloured, 2 plates of a moa skeleton, and one other folding plate; contemporary buckram. Neat inked accession note at head of title, a fine copy of this attractively produced work, the photographic plates printed by Jaffe in Vienna. \$300-400

35 THE HAMPTON PLAINS GUIDE. Being a handbook of information pertaining to the Hampton Plains goldfield and its mining leases, their number, location, ownership, capitalisation etc. etc. Kalgoorlie, 1920. 36 JACK, Robert L. and ETHERIDGE, Robert. The geology and palaeontology of Queensland and New Guinea. Brisbane, 1892. Two volumes quarto, with 68 plates and maps, some coloured, in original cloth (slightly flecked), and 6-sheet geological map of Queensland in separate uniform case with printed spine label (slightly chipped). Occasional stamps (not on the plates or maps), but an excellent set of a work rarely found complete or in such good condition. \$1000-1500

37 JOHNSTON, Robert M. Systematic account of the geology of Tasmania. Hobart, 1888. Thick quarto, with numerous maps, sections, diagrams and plates, including portraits of Truganini and 'King Billy'; original half calf. Folding map of Tasmania with skilfully sealed tear, stamp at head of title and on versos of plates. \$300-400

38 MEDLICOTT, H., BLANFORD, W., MALLET, F., and BALL, V. A manual of the geology of India. Calcutta, 1879-87. Four volumes octavo, with 7 maps and 36 plates; original gilt-decorated cloth. Stamp

on one endpaper, hinges of first two volumes a little strained, a very good set. Lacking the separate map. \$300-400

39 MURCHISON, Roderick Impey. *The Silurian System, founded on geological researches . . .* London, 1839. Two parts in two volumes quarto, with 3 engraved maps, 14 lithographed plates (two folding and linen-backed, three hand-coloured), 9 folding geological sections hand-coloured and linen-backed, 13 engraved or lithographed plates of fossils, and large engraved geological map on 3 sheets, hand-coloured and linen-backed; nineteenth-century half calf (a bit rubbed, inked library numbers at head of spines, one of the cloth sides unevenly faded), the 3-sheet map in matching bookform case (rebacked with the spine mounted and the front board renewed in style). Circular red stamp of the Canterbury (New Zealand) Public Library at head of titles, in two margins of text, margin of one plate and reverse of each sheet of the large map, two fossil plates lightly stained; but otherwise clean, the large map in attractive condition, on fine linen.

First edition, scarce complete. Like many of the sets that now appear on the market, ex-library, but cleaner than most of them and with a notable provenance, linking two of the most eminent British geologists of the era: part one is inscribed by the author on a preliminary blank 'To Professor Jameson from his friend Roderick Murchison'. Robert Jameson, author of numerous geological works, was Regius Professor of Natural History at the University of Edinburgh for fifty years. \$4000-6000

40 PARKER, Critchley, *publisher*. *West Australian mining*. Special edition of the *Australian Mining Standard*. Melbourne, 1904. Folio, pp. ii, xiv, 236, xv-xxviii, iii-iv (complete thus), profusely illustrated with photographs and maps; contemporary cloth (recased, slightly worn), retaining the title-wrappers. Stamp at head of wrapper, a few small marginal repairs.

A comprehensive survey, very scarce. \$800-1000

41 SELWYN, Alfred. *Geological notes . . . of a journey in South Australia from Cape Jervis to Mount Serle*. [Adelaide, 1860]. South Australian Parliamentary Paper, small folio, drop title, pp.16, with very large lithographed map, hand-coloured and linen-backed, and 5 plates, one folding; disbound. Slight staining, a very good copy.

Rare. Journal of an expedition 'For the purpose of examining into and reporting on the geological evidence of the probable extent and character of gold-bearing rocks, as also on any indications of the existence of workable coal-fields'. \$500-600

42 TENISON WOODS, *Rev.* Julian E. The geology of Portland. Two lectures. Portland, 1865. **Bound with** 28 offprints or extracts by Tenson Woods from colonial scientific journals, mostly on shells and corals, several with plates; nineteenth-century cloth(wearing) with the binder's ticket of W.Christie of Woolloomooloo, manuscript list of contents tipped-in. A few stamps (two on the Portland pamphlet). \$300-400

Extremely rare chart issued for the use of D'Entrecasteaux on his voyage in search of La Pérouse. Trove records only the National Library copy, with manuscript annotations by Louis de Freycinet dated to 1802-03, and we have traced no other examples. Worldcat adds only a Spanish manuscript copy, from this original French printing, in the Archivo del Museo Naval, Madrid. \$15,000-20,000

44 BLAEU, Willem. Nova totius terrarum orbis geographica ac hydrographica tabula. [Amsterdam, *circa* 1630]. Engraved double-hemispherical map, hand-coloured, the panelled borders illustrated with allegorical figures representing the four seasons, the four elements and celestial bodies, and depictions of the seven wonders of the world, 40 x 54 centimetres, Dutch text on verso. Central fold. A very nice example, with wide margins.

One of the finest world maps from the golden age of Dutch cartography.

Showing the first Dutch landfalls in the Gulf of Carpentaria. \$800-1200

A splendid world map, one of the first to show Tasman's discoveries in Australia and New Zealand. With fine contemporary colour including gold highlights, and wide margins. Shirley 428. \$16,000-18,000

47 BLAEU, Joan. *Nova et accuratissima totius terrarum orbis tabula*. [Amsterdam, *circa* 1675]. Another issue, with Spanish text on verso, also with fine contemporary colour including gold highlights, and wide margins. Central fold (strengthened on verso), tiny infill in blank area of the Atlantic, with associated very slight closed tears, a little dusty.

48 BLAEU, Joan. *Nova et accuratissima totius terrarum orbis tabula*. [Amsterdam, *circa* 1680]. Another printing, from a new, fractionally smaller plate. Central fold (strengthened at the foot on the verso), small marginal repairs, a little thinning of the paper visible only on the blank verso; but a very good, well-margined example.

With numerous revisions, adding the latest geographical information.

The first English map of Australia.

A floor plan of the Burgerszaal (Citizens' Hall) in the grand new City Hall of Amsterdam, showing the three large maps inlaid in marble and copper, long since destroyed. The map of the eastern hemisphere includes an outline of Van Diemen's Land and the Gulf of Carpentaria, derived from Tasman's journals of his voyages of 1642-43 and 1644, and so is one of the earliest depictions of his Australian discoveries. Schilder, map 66; Shirley 423.

53 DE JODE, Gerard and Cornelis. Novae Guineae forma & situs. [Antwerp, 1593]. Engraved map, hand-coloured, 34 x 21.5 centimetres, Latin text on verso. Remargined at left, as often, small repair on verso below the cartouche at the bottom, one minute (barely visible) worm-hole. Very scarce map, often cited as the first map of Australia (by Tooley and Schilder for instance). Once thought (notably by Tooley) to be the first map to show the Dutch discoveries in Australia, it was certainly one of the earliest when originally engraved.
