#### THE ALEXANDER COLLECTION


The John Alexander collection of rare books documenting the European discovery and settlement of Australia and the Pacific is one of the finest of its kind formed in this century. Realising that it was still possible to assemble such a notable collection, John has been a major buyer in his field, from leading dealers and auction houses here and overseas, for the last twenty years. He has particularly sought out books in fine condition and special copies, as will be seen in the following pages. Highlights of this first sale include that legendary rarity, the original edition of Blaxland's Journal of a tour of discovery across the Blue Mountains, 1823; an attractive copy of the first Australian children's book, Charlotte Barton's A mother's offering to her children, 1841; William Bland's Journey of discovery to Port Phillip, 1837, the momentous expedition of Hovell and Hume; the very rare set of lithographed views by Robert Dixon and group portraits by Thomas Balcombe, 1837, with Dixon's original drawings for his two views; An historical narrative of the discovery of New Holland and New South Wales, 1786, the first separately published account of New South Wales; a finely bound set of Flinders's Voyage to Terra Australis, 1814, with the text volumes on large paper; Ernest Giles's *Journal of a forgotten expedition*, 1880, a prized rarity; Louis de Freycinet's annotated copy of Phillip Parker King's Narrative of a survey of the intertropical and western coasts of Australia, in the rare issue of 1826 and with two additional, earlier charts; a magnificent set of the Voyage de La Pérouse autour du monde, 1797, beautifully bound by Bedford, with the atlas on large and thick paper and the plates in two states; Mann's Present picture of New South Wales, 1811, with the splendid views by John Eyre unfolded; The Voyage of Governor Phillip to Botany Bay, 1789, with the natural history plates coloured, in a contemporary binding; the manuscript journal kept by the surgeonsuperintendent on the voyage of the *Belgravia*, transporting convicts to Western Australia in 1866; and John White's Journal of a voyage to New South Wales, 1790, the rare issue with the plates printed in sepia and more delicately coloured than what is usually seen in coloured copies, and bound with Governor Phillip's *Extracts of letters*, 1791 and *Copies* and extracts of letters, 1792: a very desirable contemporary assembly.

John is now moving overseas after a distinguished career as a media executive and senior journalist—he is a former editor-in-chief and publisher of the *Sydney Morning Herald.* The return of his books to the market provides his fellow collectors with a rare opportunity. A second sale is planned for next year, focusing on pre-settlement books and natural history.

**1** ALLEN, James. Journal of an experimental trip by the 'Lady Augusta' on the River Murray. Adelaide, 1853. *Octavo, with a frontispiece; contemporary tan polished calf with red spine label (front joint cracking but cords quite sound).* 

The first navigation of the Murray by steam-boat. An attractive copy of a book rarely found in a binding of the period. The frontispiece depicts the *Lady Augusta* on the Murray at Swan Hill. Ferguson 5897.

2 ANGAS, George French. Six views of the gold field of Ophir, at Summerhill and Lewis' Ponds Creeks [*wrapper title*]. Sydney, 1851. Oblong folio, pp. [*ii*] ('Description of the plates') and 6 tinted lithographed plates; untrimmed in the original printed wrappers (with small marginal repairs, the narrow cloth spine renewed), contained in half calf slipcase with cloth chemise.

Rare, especially so in the original wrappers. The first plate book devoted to the goldfields, the fine large views lithographed by the artist. Ferguson 5996; Wantrup 239, noting that this was 'the only significant visual record of the New South Wales goldfields that was published. The lithographs are considered to be among Angas's most satisfying work'. \$10,000-12,000



**3** ARAGO, Jacques. Souvenirs d'un aveugle. Voyage autour du monde [and the supplementary volume], Chasses-Drame. Paris, 1840. Five volumes octavo, with 2 portraits and 60 hand-coloured plates + 15 plates, three with added colour; attractively bound in contemporary quarter red calf, the spines ornamentally gilt. The text foxed, a few plates affected and those on toned paper mildly browned, contemporary owner's small red stamp on titles and on half-title or front endpaper.

The artist's account of Freycinet's voyage in 1817-20, much expanded from his original text, *Promenade autour du monde*, published in 1822. This is the rare and desirable second edition of the *Souvenirs* (first published 1839), with the plates now finely hand-coloured (those in the supplementary volume not issued coloured but the initial three in this copy with skilful early colouring).

The lengthy account of the visit to Western Australia and New South Wales includes five Aboriginal portraits and the supplementary volume includes chapters on the black snake encountered in New South Wales (with a plate) and on kangaroo hunting. Very rare views after drawings by Robert Russell. A total of 16 plates was published, in four parts, but this set of selected plates is complete as issued, all such copies probably having the same series of views, priced at 13s. 6d. With a contemporary ownership inscription at the head of the wrapper, 'Mrs Gregg, 5 Park Square [Regent's Park, London]'. Ferguson 2079 (variant); Wantrup 225b.



The first Australian children's book, very rare and in appealing condition. The thirteen stories are drawn largely from recent colonial history, including the wreck of the *Charles Eaton* and the subsequent search for survivors. One story is entitled 'Anecdotes of the Aborigines of New South Wales'. Ferguson 3158; Wantrup 487. \$20,000-30,000


Very scarce. Ferguson 731: 'A book famous for the author's attack upon the transportation system and the inhuman treatment of convicts in New South Wales. Governor Macquarie was unjustly criticized'; Wantrup 42. \$1500-2000

**11** BENNET, Henry Grey. A letter to Earl Bathurst, Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, on the condition of the colonies in New South Wales and Vandieman's Land. London, 1820. *Octavo; bound without the half-title in full navy calf, spine panelled, by Aquarius. A little foxing.*

Octavo, with a folding engraved map, the expedition route picked out in red as usual; original blue wrappers with early linen backstrip, in a half morocco folding box. Stamp of the Royal Geographical Society on wrapper, foot of dedication leaf and reverse of map (with faint show-through in bottom corner).

Rare and much-prized. Styled on the title 'second edition', this is in reality the first published edition, and the first with the map, following the unpublished proof printing of 1831, which is known in only a handful of copies. With an interesting provenance: an inscription on the reverse of the map records that this copy was 'Presented to the Geographical Society by Captain Mallard of the Kinnear'. Charles Mallard was the master of a number of ships bringing convicts and settlers to the Australian colonies in the 1830s and 40s. In April 1838 he arrived in Sydney on the *Kinnear* with the first bounty migrants from Germany; presumably he acquired his copy then. It was sold by the Royal Geographical Society in 1890, as a duplicate, to Edward and Mary Bage of Melbourne, as a further inscription records. Ferguson 2234; Wantrup 110.

14 BLAXLAND, Gregory. A journal of a tour of discovery across the Blue Mountains in New South Wales. London, 1823. *Duodecimo*, *pp. 48; uncut in original brown wrappers (the thin spine deficient, small stain at foot of front wrapper). Two manuscript corrections in the text, as usual. An excellent copy, in original state. Folding half morocco box.* 

#### A fabled rarity


Blaxland's journal of his famous expedition in 1813 with Wentworth and Lawson to discover a route through the Blue Mountains, which presented a formidable barrier to the expansion of settlement westward from Sydney. An appendix adds the text of a Government Order of 1814 describing the explorations of George William Evans beyond the point reached by the three previous explorers. Printed for Blaxland while on a visit to England, to distribute to his relatives and friends (as he records in the preface), the edition must have been very small. This is the Bremer copy (sold at auction in 1988), one of three recorded in private hands and the only one of these in the original wrappers. Remarkably, all three came on to market within eleven years—between 1978 and 1989—but with no further additions to the supply its great rarity has been confirmed. (The previous auction record is for the Eccles copy, sold by Sotheby's in 1953: this was also uncut in the wrappers, so may well be the present copy). It has a family provenance, with the contemporary signature, at the head of the preliminary blank, of J.S. Clarabut, a Blaxland relative, of Deal in Kent. (An internet search reveals that two of his descendants of the latter part of the century had Blaxland as their middle name). No doubt Gregory Blaxland presented it to him. The very rare complete official record of the Burke and Wills expedition, organized by the Royal Society of Victoria. The first 8 reports were published in collected form in 1863, providing a detailed account of the preparation for the expedition and its progress, as well as the Society's verdict on its tragic conclusion. By 1873, when the muchdelayed final Report was ready, there remained, its authors record, 'about 200 copies of the 1863 printing, and it was resolved to publish this final Supplementary Report bound up in one volume with the previous Reports, and to distribute them to public institutions in the colony and elsewhere'. The complete series therefore very seldom appears on the market. As always, the date lettered on the binding is 1872. Provenance: Dr David Wilkie, the Exploration Committee's Hon. Treasurer and initially its Chairman, and by descent. (With a bookseller's enclosed note affirming this). 

Freycinet's notes and comments appear on 103 pages. He in turn is mentioned a number of times by King, not always favourably: of Freycinet's plan of an archipelago near the north-west coast of the continent, King remarks that 'it is so defective many of his islands could not be recognised'.

The two additional charts are on thicker paper and bound in at the end of the first volume. Dated July 1825, they are earlier versions of the main chart appearing in the published work and of its tippedon extension, both showing some differences. The chart that was issued in 1826 as an extension is here larger (87 x 42 mm.), with the coastline extending north for a further five degrees, and, unlike the later version, it has its own title: 'Chart of the west coast of Australia'.


An important survival from the last years of the transportation system. As well as daily entries, Smith provides a full list of the 277 convicts embarked, with their age, literacy, crime, sentence and character; and a careful record of their routine, including exercise, education and spiritual guidance, sanitation and punishments for misdemeanours. Especially notable are the six appendices he adds, signing each one, under the following headings: 'General rules' to be observed by convicts; their 'Weekly routine'; 'List of prisoners who have committed themselves during the voyage, showing the nature of their offence and the punishment awarded'; 'Account of the number of convicts classed according to their ages and abilities to write'; 'A list of the prisoners who have distinguished themselves by exemplary conduct, and for reasons below are specially recommended for the notice of His Excellency the Governor'; 'Punishment [dealt out by] the Pensioner Guard on board the convict ship Belgravia'; and 'Remarks', including Smith's recommendations for the treatment of scurvy, which was very prevalent on board.

The *Belgravia* arrived at Fremantle in July 1866, bringing, as well as the convicts, 96 pensioner guards and their families, and 10 other passengers: the voyage achieved in 88 days with only two deaths. Convict transportation to Australia ended in 1868.

The beginnings of journalism in South Australia. Appearing in Adelaide a year after the solitary London issue, volume 1 number 2 was the first newspaper printed in the new colony. It is present here in very good state, the first leaf trimmed close at the outer margin but clear of the printed surface. G.H. Pitt, in his *The Press in South Australia*, *1836-1850*, suggests that the print run of the first Adelaide issue, of 6 pages, would have been about 100 copies—of which very few can have survived. This substantially complete series from the first three years is quite possibly the only such collection in private hands.

The contents are of great interest, with regular reports recording the progress of exploration, relations with the 'natives', the feverish politics of the struggling colony, the first land sales, with the names of the buyers and prices, and much else. The first Adelaide issue bears the signature of John Ridley (1806-1887), the renowned inventor of the 'stripper', the world's first mobile grain harvester, which contributed significantly to the economic recovery of the colony in the 1840s.


With a very notable inclusion: the twelfth number prints, for the first time, much of Hamilton Hume's journal of his expedition to Port Phillip. Years later, in 1855, Hume stated in his *Brief statement of facts in connexion with an overland expedition*, that 'I published in the Sydney Morning Herald, I think in or about the year 1833 [his memory failing him here], a few short extracts from my journal of our tour to Geelong, and although the Sydney government failed to make any effectual use of the information, first communicated in 1825, my letter [with the journal extracts] attracted the attention of the Van Diemen's Land settlers, who, acting upon it, went over, and finding my statement of the nature of the country around Port Phillip correct, effected the first successful settlement at Hobson's Bay'. In fact the 'few short extracts' to which he refers make up a coherent narrative of the expedition running to nearly 3000 words and include significant details not previously published: the account in the Sydney Gazette in February, 1825 was extracted from Hovell's journal, and William Bland's celebrated text of 1831 derives very largely from that journal.



White's *Journal* is an example of the rare issue with most of the plates and the engraved title printed in sepia, and with the colouring superior to that found in the standard coloured copies: in this issue it is more detailed, the palette is subtler and more varied, and the backgrounds are frequently more finished. The two collections of Phillip's despatches are both rare, and, though all three works were published by Debrett, it is most unusual to find them together in a binding of the period.
